

#### THE TOASTER COMMUNITY HEATS UP!

With students making their way back to campus, the Toaster experienced an almost 900% increase in community members in FY22 — reaching more than 2,100 students, up from only 239 in FY 2021.

Demonstrating that the Toaster is a student-centered space, 41% of the 135 events, workshops, or student meetings held in the Toaster were facilitated by student leadership and student organizations.

In addition to student empowerment, the Toaster's dedication to promoting multi-disciplinary collaboration is illustrated by the community demographics: **The Toaster draws students from high school (PSEO) to graduate programs** and from 19 different U of M colleges.

#### STUDENT ADVISORY BOARD



### Research

#### **TEXT AND DATA MINING**

Text and data mining methods and tools enable researchers to study and analyze large amounts of content and data (from news and social media, for instance) — but requires advanced programming skills and new ways to access content. That is where Librarian Cody Hennesy and Michael Beckstrand of LATIS (Liberal Arts Technologies and Information Services) can help.

HAPPY 15TH ANNIVERSARY TO THE UNIVERSITY DIGITAL CONSERVANCY!



The <u>University Digital Conservancy</u> (UDC) celebrated its 15th anniversary in 2022!

The UDC holds more than 100,000 articles, University documents, dissertations, datasets, and more — recently adding 11,000 issues of the Minnesota Daily. It provides free, public access and long-term preservation to work created across the U of M system.

The Data Repository for the University of Minnesota (DRUM) is a program of the UDC and is the place for U of M faculty, staff, and students to share, publish, and preserve their digital research data for long-term access and future use.

#### **DATA CURATION NETWORK**

Since its founding by the University of Minnesota Libraries and partners in 2018, the Data Curation Network (DCN) has grown to 17 members. The Network has collectively curated more than 300 datasets through a shared curation workflow.

In the past year and in the coming year, the DCN has been involved in two collaborative research projects, is actively preparing for and supporting researchers in advance of the upcoming NIH Data Sharing requirements, and is hosting a <u>learning</u> series to support researchers, program officers, and librarians.



# **Collections**

In June 2022, the University of Minnesota Board of Regents approved funding for an Off-site Collections Facility — a project long sought by the Libraries to ensure preservation of collections well into the future.

#### A DATABASE'S IMPACT

About 120,000 pages of material from the Libraries' Immigration History Research Center Archives were downloaded in FY22 through Migration to New Worlds II, a resource for undergraduate research and teaching. Migration to New Worlds II, an Adam Matthew Digital product, includes more than 70,000 pages and audio recordings from the Libraries' Immigration History Research Center Archives, and hundreds of thousands of digitized materials from other collections, including material from the National Archives (UK) and the Tenement Museum, New York.

#### **HISTORY DAY**

During the COVID-19 pandemic, online access for schools in Minnesota was granted as part of the University's National History Day support.



#### MAPPING PREJUDICE

Mapping Prejudice resumed working with community-based volunteers scanning deeds for racial covenants, offered 25 public presentations, and added a role as an official observer for a <u>Uniform Law Commission</u> process to create model legislation related to discharge or removal of historical racial covenants.



# INCLUSION, DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND ACCESSIBILITY (IDEA)

Many individual staff, committees, and departments engaged in IDEA initiatives at various levels throughout the year. A few highlights include:

- A new all-gender restroom was built and opened on the ground floor of Elmer L. Andersen Library;
- The Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Leadership Committee worked with an outside consultant to conduct an IDEA climate assessment survey for Libraries staff, the results of which have been shared, discussed, and acted upon at many levels;
- The Libraries co-sponsored a system-wide Global Accessibility Awareness Day;
- The Libraries Accessibility
   Steering Committee released

- A staff Anti-racism Community of Practice continues to meet monthly.

# Leadership

#### THREE NEW AULS JOIN THE LIBRARIES

Three new Associate University Librarians started in summer 2022. Each one brings a large measure of enthusiasm to their roles. Dean Lisa German told staff: "I am so excited about our new leadership team. They are working together in ways that I had hoped — and beyond."



Jody Gray, AUL for Research, is the only one among them who has previously worked at the U of M Libraries.

She also served in diversity director roles with the American Library Association, and at the U's College of Food, Agricultural, and Natural Resource Sciences (CFANS).

Gray is a member of the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe, from South Dakota. She brings that lens to her work with faculty, students, and staff involved in Libraries research.

"How can we decolonize
[the research enterprise]?
How do we recognize harms
that exist in research practices currently and
historically?" And, she adds:
"How can we contribute
to these conversations
locally and globally?"



**Evangela Q. Oates, Ph.D.**, AUL for Student Success, comes to Minnesota from New York. She finds parallels

in their iconic rivers, the Mississippi and the Hudson, and major divides between urban and rural.

Frameworks for her approach to student success are 1) fostering a sense of belonging and 2) mattering.

"What environments does the U nurture that allows racially minoritized students to see their value and contributions as beneficial to their personal development, their communities, and the U?"

Oates also would like to see more connections between students, particularly Black, indigenous, and students of color, and their communities in the Twin Cities. The U and its Libraries collaborating in new ways with community colleges also may help students navigate higher education.



**L. Angie Ohler**, AUL for Collections and Content Strategy, appreciates the U of M Libraries long, strong history of

partnerships, such as the Big Ten Academic Alliance. "Where you have strong partnerships between libraries, you have opportunities to change the landscape for the better," Ohler says.

She is glad to be here as part of a new team, under Dean Lisa German. "Sometimes the impetus for change can happen so much more quickly when you have people with new lenses looking at things."

"Everything we do in collections and content strategy has an impact across the campus community and beyond. Whether we purchase scholarly resources ..., digitize existing content ..., or negotiate with publishers to ensure that University of Minnesota research and publications reach a wider audience through open access: all of these have an enormous impact on the teaching, learning, and research mission of the University."





# **Development and Acquisitions**

#### FROM THE ARCHIVES

The James Ford Bell Library acquired a rare, 17th-century map of the Java Sea, thanks to generous funding from the James Ford Bell Trust.

The 1672 manuscript chart, by Dutch cartographer Johannes Blaeu, was commissioned by the Dutch East India Company to provide more accurate information of the area for its ships coming from the Indian Ocean or sailing south of the region to expand trade. "It is one of only about 356 Dutch East India Company charts that have survived out of an estimated 55,000 created between 1619 and 1799," said Marguerite Ragnow, curator of the James Ford Bell Library.

### **Donor Profile**

#### AN ACCIDENTAL CURATOR

Lisa Vecoli grew up in the Archives and returned to transform the Tretter Collection.

Lisa Vecoli used to play hide and seek in the archival stacks, where her father, Rudolph Vecoli, directed the Immigration History Research Center for 38 years. So when she joined the Advisory Board for the Tretter Collection in 2000 — and when she was hired as staff in 2012 — she felt like she was coming home.

Now Vecoli has a pronoun issue. In talking about the <u>Tretter Collection in Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual</u> <u>and Transgender Studies</u> at the U of M, sometimes she says "We," and other times, she switches to "They." Vecoli led Tretter for six years before retiring in 2018, then returned from 2021–22 to fill in until a new permanent curator was named. So her confusion is understandable.

"I ended up at the archive by accident, and it was magical. I had no training but I had passion."

#### Reflections

In autumn, the trees along the Mississippi River glow with color, mirroring the Pride flag hanging beside Vecoli's front door. Her den is lined with more than a thousand pulp paperbacks from the 1950s and 1960s featuring women loving women. They typically end with a woman marrying a man. She also owns thousands of contemporary lesbian novels, written by/for lesbians, almost all with "happy" endings. All the books will go to the Tretter Collection.

Vecoli says she was in the right place at the right time when she took the Tretter job in 2012. Although she has no formal training in being an archivist or curator, she brought her passion as a lesbian activist, her deep connections in the local community, and her understanding of the need to better organize the remarkable materials that Jean-Nickolaus Tretter had collected over the years.

What Vecoli is most proud of during her tenure is making the materials more accessible and diversifying the voices in the archive.

Vecoli also expanded holdings on lesbians, people of color, bisexual communities, voices from non-urban areas, and trans/gender queer

communities. Usage is up as a result. Perhaps the highlight of Vecoli's two stints at Tretter was her leadership in creating, developing, and managing the <u>Tretter Transgender Oral History Project</u>. Vecoli raised the funds for all three phases, including the upcoming Phase Three during her one year return. <u>The Project</u> is the largest of its kind in the world – documenting the transgender experience during a pivotal time.

#### Focusing on students

Even before she worked at Tretter, Vecoli and her wife, Marjean Hoeft, put the archive in their will. "There are many good causes, but this one was the perfect combination of passion and impact," says Vecoli. "I knew the amount of money we have to give could make a real tangible difference in an organization the size of the Tretter Collection."

Student employees will benefit from her bequest, Vecoli says. "My donation will really have an impact." The money will hire several student employees each year. "They improve the archive and the archive changes their lives — a win/win."

It is that "transformational impact" that the Tretter has on students that Vecoli, after she is gone, wants to support. The Tretter transformed her life, after all.


