Each month's presentation is based on materials in the University Libraries' Archives and Special Collections. Featured presenters include archivists, curators, and scholars from the University community and beyond.

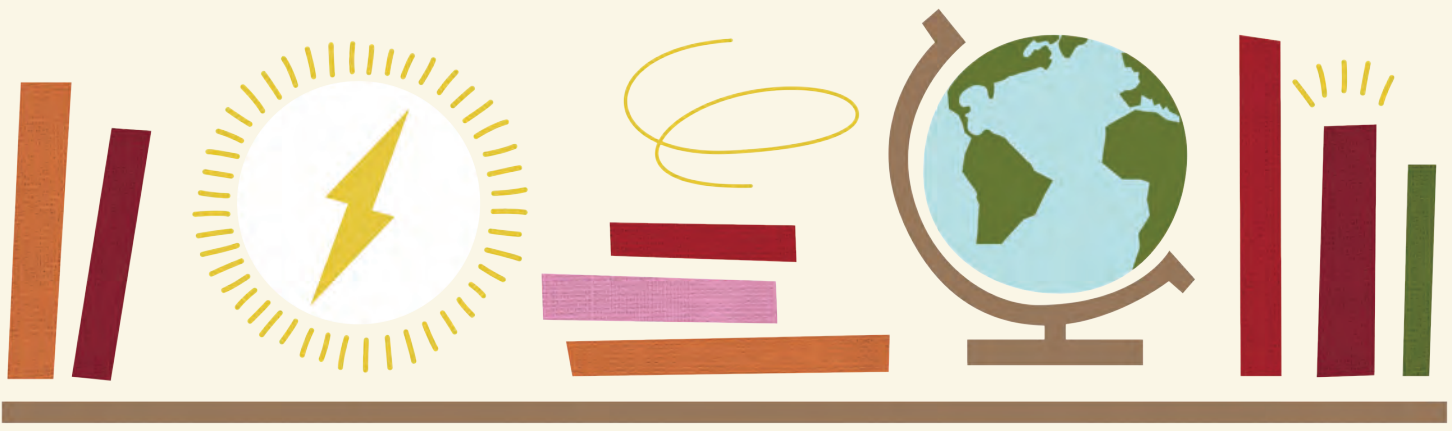
